

Dear Friend in Christ,

God's people will always face times of trials and testing. Whether it was the early church, which faced times of trial and testing during the Roman Empire, or whether it is the church today in places where Christians are persecuted, God's people will always be confronted with difficulties. Now, you may think, "Those places are centuries or continents away. What does this have to do with me?"



Times of trial and testing do not only happen on a large social scale. They also happen on an individual and personal scale, to people like you and me. The coronavirus pandemic has affected all of us in some way and changed the way we live. The political and social turbulence in our nation is concerning. Perhaps you are facing some sort of personal trial or difficulty now, at work, in a relationship, with your finances, with your health, or in another area of life.

Acts 16 tells about how God used Paul to start a brand-new work in a city that had never before heard the gospel. It



tells the story of how Paul and Silas found themselves in prison when they shared the good news in the city of Philippi. They experienced both success and difficulties. Have you ever thought about that possibility? We can experience difficulties even during times of success. Some Christians might be tempted to think that the presence of difficulties means they are somehow living outside of the will of God. But that's not necessarily true. Sometimes Christians can be right where God wants them to be, doing exactly what God has asked them to do and still face persecution, opposition, misunderstanding, and suspicion.

Do you know what Paul and Silas' response was after being thrown in jail? They sang! Even though they were in chains, they worshipped the Lord in the middle of their trouble and pain. Through miraculous circumstances, Paul and Silas were delivered from their imprisonment and even ended up baptizing the warden of the prison!

We should keep this story from Acts in mind because it reminds us that we will go through trials. And this phrase is important: we will "go through" trials. Trials are made to be gone through: you will not remain in them. Trials are made to go through because our God is bigger than any trouble you could experience.

It is one thing to say, "God is in control," and a completely different thing to really act as if God is control. In part, Paul

learned this lesson during his time in Philippi and then years later when the Philippians came to his aid while he was in prison in Rome. When Paul wrote his letter to the church in Philippi, ten years had passed since the account in Acts 16. Some things had definitely changed. The church in Philippi was growing in love and concern for each other, but they were also looking after the needs of people who lived very far away from them. Paul was one of those people! Because this much had not



changed: Paul found himself imprisoned again, this time in Rome. The Philippian church had been persecuted since their founding, but they remained as one of the poorest and yet the most generous of all the churches that Paul planted (Philippians 4:14-16, 2 Corinthians 8:1-5).



The great lesson from Philippi is that our actions become the message. Our lives—individually and corporately—become the Good News. We can demonstrate to the watching world that we confidently believe God is in control. The Philippians are noteworthy because, as Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians, "They gave themselves to the Lord; and then, by God's will they gave themselves to us as well" (2 Co 8:5, GNT) Their hearts became one with Christ and the blessings of their efforts will never be forgotten.

We take great pride in the notion that we've done something ourselves. When asked we usually share without hesitation that "I did that myself". It may be something ranging from a simple project like setting a new mail box and post, or planting

the flowers in a window box. The project could also be something that took days, weeks or even months such as building a garage or house. While most would agree that planting the window box can be done alone, it's much more difficult to believe that a garage or house could be built by someone absolutely alone, without any help at all. Truth be told (and simple observation usually) that even the "building off the grid" folks on TV, don't manage much completely on their own either. They actually have family or a small crew, equipment, power tools usually and resources that don't just appear magically.

In this time when we traditionally celebrate with Family & Friends the independence of our nation, a raw truth is thrust right in front of us. We are very much dependent on each other. Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As COVID-19 restrictions gradually ease, we are thrilled at the prospects of dining out, shopping, getting a haircut... and going to church! And we are impatient to return to normal as quickly as possible. Even so, we are reminded daily that, at least for a time, the "new normal" will be much different than the old.

Ever since the beginning of the pandemic, the Ministry and Parish Councils have discussed – at great length – plans for gradually and responsibly returning to in-person worship services. These discussions are guided by God's Word and informed by the most current information available from state government, public health agencies, the synod, and other sources. We are keenly aware of our responsibility to protect both the *spiritual* and *physical* health of every person at Trinity.

Per the latest state guidelines, we have resumed modified, in-person worship services in the sanctuary. All three services will be held at the regular times, Saturday at 5:30 and Sunday at 8:30 and 10:45. Please be aware that several restrictions will necessarily apply. It is very important that we abide by these guidelines as responsible citizens, for the health and safety of our worshipers, and for liability protection.

- Everyone must RSVP intent to attend using the online booking system or contacting Mike at the church office. Each individual requires a separate reservation so that we stay within allowable limits.
- The front doors to the church will not be used. Entry will be by the Preschool door, which will be opened 15 minutes prior to the beginning of the service. A sanitation station is placed inside the entry.
- Face masks must be worn inside the building.
- The drinking fountain will be closed.
- Restrooms will be open; one person at a time please.
- Worshipers will enter the sanctuary through the West door only.
- Social distancing of at least six (and preferably 10) feet between households must be maintained in the sanctuary. This will affect seating and communion procedure.
- Singing and group recitation will be limited.
- Worshipers will exit the sanctuary through the east door, then please exit the building promptly through the garden door.
- There will be no coffee fellowship between the Sunday services until further notice.

Obviously, this will be far different than the normal worship experience and will require significant adjustment from everyone. It will be up to each of us to decide when and under what conditions we feel comfortable returning to inperson worship. Services will continue to be live-streamed so that those who choose to wait can join remotely.

We humbly plead for your patience – and your prayers – as we tiptoe toward "normal" during this extraordinary time. Please keep love for, and the health and safety of, others at the heart of your decisions. If you have questions, please do not hesitate to contact Mike at the church office (367-8923).

Let us then give thanks and rejoice in the words of the Psalmist, "I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go into the house of the LORD.'" (Psalm 122:1, NKJV).
