

Dear Friends in Christ,

Revelation, chapter 5 verses 9-10, has a very powerful and important message for all of us in America today. The world has always had trials and difficulties. Sunday messages a few weeks ago looked at the sufferings of the early church community of John's day.

We have difficulties today. One of them, for example, is this coronavirus. It has radically changed how we do just about everything. Now, this text doesn't really help us too much with dealing with COVID-19, but it's powerfully speaking to another issue that we have brewing in America—that of racial harmony and unity.

#### REVELATION

"And they sang a new song, saying: "You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, because you were slain, and with your blood you purchased for God persons from every tribe and language and people and nation. <sup>10</sup> You have made them to be a kingdom and priests to serve our God, and they will reign on the earth." Rev 5:9-10, NIV

What I hope you get from this is a deep appreciation for how important racial harmony is to God. I also, hope that you can see that the great diversity among the nations and races in this world is God's work. He has done this in order to display just how precious and important the blood and the sacrifice of Christ is for true harmony and unity for all people.

What I think is important is that when you purchase something—as the text says that Christ did with His own blood—you generally do it pointedly, you know what you're doing and why. The idea of racial harmony and justice is not originally of human desire, but God's. He desires it so much that he paid an unfathomable cost for it—the sacrificial blood of Jesus Christ. The problem of racial inequality and racial injustice is real because sin is real and everybody's a sinner. The answer, as the text tells us clearly, is the blood of Christ.

God intends to have a people of his own, not just from white or black families but from all ethnic groups. All shades and all cultures. This is underlined by the four words, "people, tribe, language and nation [ethnos]." This covers the

whole range of ethnic diversity in the world. God designed, aimed, purposed to have a people that are very diverse.

And this is probably where the work of Christ becomes controversial: God intends for these people to be united in a profound, God-centered harmony in Christ. The world thinks it doesn't need Jesus. It tries to use force or laws to create unity apart from Christ. God's remedy through Christ's sacrifice achieved unity that the world can't because it paid for the sin of world. The world accentuates our differences and makes them our identity. But God accentuates His love for us and for all people, and that is truly our identity. It is not that I am white or black, young or old, rich or poor, male or female, Irish or American, a teacher or a police officer. All life matters to God. He made all of us. He made us to love us, to have a relationship with us as a good Father. He paid a high price to redeem all of us from sin.

This is why divisions, not just of race or color, but of anything that doesn't "love your neighbor as yourself" are so serious. God purposely purchased people from every tribe and nation to magnify the power and love of Jesus Christ.

If bringing all peoples together as one, cost the Father and the Son such an extreme and unfathomable price, should we expect that it cost us nothing? That it will be easy? That the devil, who hates Christ's love and despises the aim of the cross, will just give up, just yield without a fight? To join God in loving people will be costly. It's hard work to love people, but it's what we're called to do (Luke 14:25-35, Luke 22:31-34, 1 John 3:11–18). And take heart, the blood of Jesus will not fail. Faith well exercised grows in good works. In other words, fruitful faith strengthens faith. Luther wrote, "This strength is far different from physical strength, which decreases and is consumed if one uses and does something too much. But this spiritual strength increases the more one makes use of and applies it." LW, vol. 30, p. 158

So, think deeply on this. You may not have to look too far either. He's purchased you and placed you in your family, your work, your church and society to reflect the love of Christ.

#### President's Monthly Report to the Congregation

Let us pray that our Heavenly Father will help us to be bold witnesses to Your salvation, to demonstrate a firm commitment to Your Work, and to increase our community involvement to grow Your family. Amen.

This is my report to you for the past month. To begin, I would like to explain that in my role as President of the congregation, I also chair the Parish Council, which "shall be responsible for all matters pertaining to the legal, financial, and general welfare of the congregation, including the hiring and release of paid congregational personnel and overseeing the call process for ministerial positions issued by the voters' assembly." (Bylaws Article III, Section 2.A. and D.) Please let me know what questions you have about the business of our church. As you may know, on September 13, 2020, fifty-six (56) members of our church (37 in-person in the sanctuary and 19 by live streaming over the Internet) met in a Special Voters' Assembly. The Fellowship Hall and the Capital Pledge Committee were on our agenda. What follows is my description of the meeting and it is not intended to supersede the official minutes, which are being drafted and will be approved at our next Voters' Assembly on November 22, 2020.

After declaring a quorum, we opened the meeting with prayer. I presented the factsheet (FAQs), which you may have received before the meeting by email. We then watched a YouTube video, which was based on the concept proposed by our Building Committee to the congregation about a year ago. If we were to decide ultimately to do this concept in its entirety, the new building would cost about \$2 million, (which, if necessary, could be scaled back). As we deliberated over these things during the meeting, we had the opportunity to ask questions and make comments and we considered motions and offered amendments. We considered three separate motions, and those who voted all voted Yes (without a single No vote), and we thereby approved the motions.

The motions, as approved, were:

THAT the Fellowship Hall should be demolished.

THAT the Campaign Pledge Committee should restart the campaign immediately and present a preliminary progress report to the fall 2020 Voters' Assembly on November 22, 2020.

THAT the Building Committee should restart its work by preparing a construction plan to demolish the Fellow-ship Hall and to build new church facilities, including designs, drawings, and specifications, and cost estimates that are consistent with the financial pledges made by the congregation, and present the construction plan to the spring 2021 Voters' Assembly, or as soon as a plan is ready.

After the motions were approved, David Lange, as chair of the Capital Pledge Committee, lost no time in restarting the campaign and told us that our goal is \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000. Then he announced a major gift to kick-off the campaign!

The announcement was that Pete and Sylvia Sauer have pledged \$500,000 on a dollar-for-dollar matching basis, which means that for every dollar we pledge, they will match ours up to the full amount pf their pledge. So, if we together as a congregation pledge \$500,000, then the combined gift will be \$1,000,000. Thank you, Pete and Sylvia!

David then asked that each of us prayerfully consider making our own pledge by filling out a pledge card. The Capital Pledge Committee will provide us with pledge cards and instructions. David told us to look for a newsletter from the committee soon. We closed our meeting with prayer and adjourned.

In closing this report, I hope you are staying healthy and I pray that we continue to take care of each other at Trinity, including our families, our friends, and our community.

#### **ALL ARE WELCOME Campaign has resumed!**

The Trinity ALL ARE WELCOME Campaign for raising funds for expansion and rehabilitation of the fellowship hall as been resumed. The Voters Meeting on September 13, 2020 took action to resume the campaign that had been suspended in March 2020 at the outset of the COVID-19 lockdown. Trinity will be mailing the next issue of the Campaign Newsletter, along with pledge cards and project description, within the coming days. The campaign will focus on sharing the need, the goals, and distribution of pledge cards. The campaign will



continue through November 22, 2020 (Sunday before Thanksgiving) at which point we will be able to assess our ability to pursue a building project to replace the hail and water damaged fellowship hall. Our goal is \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000 to achieve a full answer to our needs. The mailed materials will include a testimonial from Pete and Sylvia Sauer who have generously promised a \$500,000 matching fund to inspire Trinity members to respond enthusiastically to the pledge drive. 
