Dear friends and members of Trinity,

Maybe you're retired, but I'm sure you've felt the impact of COVID-19 personally.



To daily be aware that Christ has been with us and that he has been providing for us all along is a very helpful frame of mind. It provides a sense of equilibrium in a world that is constantly changing. Being thankful for his goodness and care speaks peace to our souls and bears good fruit in our lives. God will take care of things.

Jesus said, "And don't be concerned about what to eat and what to drink. Don't worry about such things. ³⁰ These things dominate the thoughts of unbelievers all over the world, but your Father already knows your needs. ³¹ Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and he will give you everything you need. ³² So don't be afraid, little flock. For it gives your Father great happiness to give you the Kingdom." Luke 12:29-32 (NLT)

Jesus gives us a command to seek because he wants people to learn to rely only on God. The word "seek" in the New Testament usually means to try to learn where something is, to look for, to try to find something. What God wants is for us to find is a deeper faith in Christ's love and to share that with others. One good thing that can come from unstable times, like this corona crisis, is that we rely more on God than on ourselves. Everyone Has A Part To Play

I've been working off and on (seasonally) for months when I have the time, to help someone remove invasive (woody) species that were let grow for decades. As many of you know by now, we heat with a wood burning furnace when the temps stay below freezing. Keeping a seasoned supply of roughly 10 cords of wood annually, turns into a real job. When I can help someone out and heat the



house as a side effect, the work seems like less of a chore, and more like "outdoor exercise" (I keep telling myself and my chiropractor during my regular visits).

Over the course of over a year, I would come and go, and each time I'd return to see a better result than anticipated. Much of the project began as a simple invitation to help out and clean up a few bothersome trees. I could offer some advice or suggestions or even comment on alternative species to plant, herbicide control methods or tips for working on the project on their own. Early in the project, it was clear that they were serious about making changes, and improving their property. They stayed busier than I did, with branch removal and understory clearing and treatment. By the next time I visited, it was obvious that they had been working hard on their own as well, I just wasn't there to witness it.

While I sat and ate my lunch on a downed log destined to become firewood before the end of the day, I took in the view. The whole scene had changed with time, with the seasons, and more importantly with the work put in by the homeowners, myself and a select few others with specialized skills. I finished my part on Halloween, and had to admire the transformation that had taken place. What was once a thicket and a somewhat spooky place to be in (not just on Halloween), had become an attractive garden. It is like a private park, with winding paths, and areas which can be used for quiet contemplation, with mulched wooded remnants flanking the paths. Even the sounds of neighbor kids playing outside, added an air of enjoyment to it all.

I couldn't help but compare the transformation that I had witnessed in this property to another project that needs our attention. You guessed it, the fellowship hall. While everyone may have their own ideas and opinions about the details, it's clear that change is needed. While we aren't going to be dealing with invasive species, or even doing any heavy lifting for the project, each of us has a part to play. We can do as little or as much as we are prayerfully called to do. Right now the "doing" is really about giving. Giving gifts which will help to move forward in the plan to show that "All are Welcome" at Trinity Lutheran Church.

There is still time to send in or drop off a pledge card at the office. Whatever your gift, no matter the amount, prayerfully consider those who are yet to come to Trinity, those who are yet to live in our community, or even those who are not yet born. Everyone who will come to Trinity should know that All are Welcome. Please join me in praying our campaign prayer.

As you know, we met on September 13, 2020 in a Special Voters' Assembly and approved these motions (*I added the bold print*):

- 1. THAT the Fellowship Hall should be demolished.
- 2. THAT the Campaign Pledge Committee should restart the campaign immediately and present a **preliminary progress report** to the fall 2020 Voters' Assembly on **November 22, 2020**.
- 3. THAT the Building Committee should restart its work by preparing a **construction plan** to demolish the Fellowship Hall and to build new church facilities, including designs, drawings, and specifications, and cost



estimates that are consistent with the financial pledges made by the congregation, and present the construction plan to the **spring Voters' Assembly**, or as soon as a plan is ready.

You should have received by regular mail a pledge card, a Campaign newsletter, and instructions for making a pledge. If you have not already done so, please prayerfully consider and make your pledge by filling out the pledge card and returning it to the Trinity Office before November 22, if possible.

Switching gears –in new business at the meeting, we will have an election of candidates for Secretary, Treasurer, Property Manager, and one Member-at-Large to the Parish Council for the term of 2021-2022. Please let me as chair of the Parish Council know if you are interested in knowing more about these elected positions and their respective roles at Trinity or if you would be interested in being a candidate. Likewise, contact Pastor Shawn about appointed positions for the Ministry Council and Kevin Donoho about being appointed as an Elder.

In closing, I pray that you are staying healthy and that we continue to take care of each other at Trinity, including our families, our friends, and our community.

As many of you know, our dear friend Stivenson Jean-Baptiste has completed his reign as the King of Parkland College, returned home to Haiti, and is working as a Feeding Program Director for Trinity Hope. Our congregation partners with Trinity Hope to sponsor the Yahve-Nissi Christian School near Bainet, and the Institute Olivier Christian School in Port-Au-Prince. *Trinity Hope** is a Lutheran ministry organization that focuses on one thing: feeding children in Christian schools throughout Haiti. *For about 25 cents per child, Trinity Hope provides one meal five days per week for over 33,500 children*. In many cases this is the only decent meal these children get each day.

When parents know their kids will be fed, they find a way to get them into school. Because they are Christian schools, the kids learn the Gospel along with their other studies. Because most of the schools are attached to churches, more kids (and their parents) end up attending church and learning more about Jesus, and His kingdom expands. Trinity Hope's impact is physical, intellectual, and most importantly, spiritual. It is a win-win-win for the children and their families.


