Dear Friends of Trinity,

I have a simple suggestion for Lent. Many people have the tradition of giving something up for Lent, but I would suggest don't give anything up unless you replace it with more of the Lord. In Lent we reflect on the Lord Jesus Christ's journey to the cross. My sin and shame is dissolved. Forever His, by His sacrifice, we stand in a love that never ends. Drawing closer to Jesus means that you call Him more than Lord. He is also your glorious friend.



Let's reflect back to where Christ's public ministry began. What might Jesus have been praying as he waited with the others to go down to John in the Jordan? Jesus had no sin to confess, no need for repentance. The author of Hebrews gives us an idea of what might have been on Jesus' lips or in His silent prayer. Hebrews 10:5-7 says:

"Therefore, when Christ came into the world, he said:

'Sacrifice and offering you did not desire, but a body you prepared for me; ⁶with burnt offerings and sin offerings you were not pleased.'

⁷Then I said, 'Here I am—it is written about me in the scroll—I have come to do your will, my God.'" Hebrew 10:5-7 (NIV)

As the people confessed their sins to God, being baptized in the Jordan, all those sins that washed away clung to Jesus like a magnet. "He personally carried our sins in his body on the cross so that we can be dead to sin and live for what is right. By his wounds you are healed. ²⁵ Once you were like sheep who wandered away. But now you have turned to your Shepherd, the Guardian of your souls." _{1 Peter 2:24-25 (NLT)}

What could we say? What words of gratitude could we pen or speak to fully express our appreciation? What could we do to thank Jesus for what He has done? He didn't want any help. All His disciples and apostles were dispersed as He walked the road alone to the cross, that God might receive a truly perfect sacrifice for sin.

From the point at which Jesus began His public ministry, He met people on the broken road of life. He lifted them beyond what plagued them into a glorious life that never ends. In the midst of life with all of its worries and cares, when your own thoughts or failings haunt you, stand in Jesus' love. Live life in love with Jesus. Encourage others to do the same with your words and actions. God glorifies Himself by shining as the Light of the world in the lives of those who believe in Jesus. In the end, what else will matter?

The apostle Paul is a great example. Before Jesus introduced Himself to Paul, the Pharisee competed with his brethren to meticulously keep all the rules and traditions. Jesus gave him a refreshing, peaceful perspective that the Lord also wants us to glory in: "This is a trustworthy saying, and everyone should accept it: 'Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners'—and I am the worst of them all. ¹⁶ But God had mercy on me so that Christ Jesus could use me as a prime example of his great patience with even the worst sinners. Then others will realize that they, too, can believe in him and receive eternal life." ¹ Timothy 1:15-16 (NLT)

We have a priceless inheritance now, what a waste if we did not draw on its abundance and drink deep of the joy and love and peace and kindness that we find in Jesus. Here is where all of this becomes very personal for you. God's glory is revealed for us to cherish our Savior Jesus, our Lord and our glorious friend. The question is, will you trust Jesus for all of this? Will you welcome the call to serve and treasure his blood-bought gift for you? For others? Blessing in Jesus,







"Re"-Discovering Our Christian Roots

I've been watching a lot of TV lately. Who am I kidding, I've always watched quite a bit of TV, and COVID hasn't helped me to trim down my viewing very much. With so many programs cancelled or in rerun mode during the pandemic, I channel surf more than usual. Even with so many channels available, the remote often lands on good old PBS, and its' quality programming, not to mention very few commercials.

One TV show in particular, is something everyone can be happy that they've watched. "Finding Your Roots", hosted by John Henry Louis Gates, Jr. With usually three celebrities of some sort or another on each episode, it usually piques my interest. The foregone conclusion is that everyone on the show will learn something about their ancestry that they were hoping they would find. But they quite often learn as well, that not everything they learn will be something of which to be proud.

Many of the guests on the show have very little knowledge of their family tree, while others have heard amazing stories about their ancestry but it's often anecdotal. During the course of each episode, in a rotating fashion between each of the usually three (3) celebrities, more of their family history or mystery is revealed. We feel like we learn about them at the same time that they learn about themselves. Some stories are so heart wrenching with details of loss and abandonment that you wonder how they even could have survived... but they did! Others learn that they come from great wealth or privilege, and wonder why they still struggled to "make it" in America.

When Mr. Gates reveals facts and items of particular surprise to each guest, he has them turn the page in their new family history book, has them read something from the page and says "how does that make you feel?" As you can imagine, their responses are often similar to our own if we were in their shoes. Other times, they must give pause to their previous notions about their history, and what makes them who they are as a person, a family member and how this may change their outlook on life.

We're not celebrities. We're not famous people. It's not likely that any one of us will ever get a phone call from Mr. John Henry Louis Gates, Jr. He won't be asking if we want to be on "Finding Your Roots" because he's found something out about us that is simply amazing or unbelievable.

While that shouldn't be surprising, take heart! We've already got a family tree that goes back to the beginning. In our baptism, we are grafted into the Family of Jesus Christ! Jesus tells us we are his and we believe Him. In the gospel of Luke (see Luke 3:22) we are told "and The Holy Ghost descended in a bodily shape like a dove upon him, and a voice came from heaven, which said, Thou art my beloved Son; in thee I am well pleased." God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit are present at our baptism as well. Luke continues to spell out the entire lineage of Jesus, all the way back to God the Father (see Luke 23-38). I invite you to turn the pages yourself, and see what is written in His Word.

Jesus has done the most unbelievable thing for us. He has adopted us into His Family! We are His!

Dear Heavenly Father,

Thank You for the roots of your family tree, which you have planted so firmly and grafted all of us into. May your Word flow through each of us freely. Encourage us by your Spirit, to grow ever stronger in faith, that we may also encourage others in life's journey. Help us to re-discover our roots, and speak your Word to those who are searching for their place in Your family.

President's Monthly Report to the Congregation

Dear members of Trinity,

By the authority given in the resolution adopted by the congregation at the special voters' assembly meeting on Sunday, January 10, 2021, we have retained Reifsteck Reid & Company, as architects, and Zion Church Builders, Inc., as construction manager, and we have started some of the initial preparatory work related to the construction of the new fellowship hall. The Building Committee, in consultation with the Parish Council, will be working with the architects (Chuck and Elsa Reifsteck) and construction manager (Jim Hinze) and the Building Committee will be responsible for making the day-to-day or routine decisions during the project. The resolution authorized expenditures for initial preparatory work not to exceed \$202,000.

Dave Kuehn, as chair of the Building Committee, has prepared a separate report in this month's newsletter with more details from the committee and its activities. Thanks, Building Committee! And special thanks to David Lange, as Treasurer, for watching over the related financial matters for us, and to Dan Roney, as Property Manager, for sharing his knowledge and experience regarding our church property.

Trinity has an excellent team working together on this important project!

Building Committee

There has been much activity in relation to the building project for the new fellowship hall over the last few weeks beginning with a site visit from our construction manager, Zion Church Builders, Inc, on January 20. This was followed by a hazardous materials assessment on January 26, a topographic survey on January 29, and a subsurface testing that will occur soon, all of which are necessary before building details can proceed. Zion provided a preliminary total cost estimate of \$2,241,198 for the building project.

Our architect, Chuck Reifsteck from Reifsteck Reid & Company, provided the following tentative schedule for the building project:

- (a) February 21, 2021: Schematic Design Phase: verify the program, modify the preliminary concept if necessary, and confirm the estimated cost,
- (b) March 21, Design Development Phase: refine the design, select major systems, and select finishes,
- (c) April-May 21, Construction Documents Phase (preparation of the "blue prints"): detailed documents for bidding,
- (d) *June 21, Procurement Phase*: bidding and negotiations, congregational vote to proceed with construction,
- (e) July 21-January 22, 2022: construction.









